NCDA&CS offers cost-share grants to assist farmers with on-farm food safety efforts

Fruit and vegetable farmers can now apply for two cost-share grants offered through the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to assist with the costs for water analysis and independent certification of an operation's good agricultural practices.

"Both grants are geared toward food safety efforts on the farm, which better enable growers to market their commodities," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "Farmers can apply for both grants, which will be available on a first-come, first-served basis."

This is the first year for the Water Analysis Cost Share grant program, which will reimburse growers up to \$200 for certified laboratory analysis of irrigation and packing house wash water for the presence of generic E.coli bacteria. Growers can be reimbursed for one water test or multiple tests during the year.

The department has previously offered the Good Agricultural Practices Certification Assistance Program, which covers up to \$600 for independent audits of a farm's GAP or good handling practices.

To be eligible, growers must have a third-party audit from an approved government agency or company that verifies GAP or GHP efforts, the audit must be conducted in 2009 and the grower must submit an application to participate in the program prior to the audit. The audit can be for farm review, field harvest and field packing activities, packing house facility, storage and transportation, and traceback.

Locally grown food products can be found at NCFarmFresh.com

RALEIGH – A newly revamped N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services Web site offers consumers looking for locally grown fruits, vegetables, meats and dairy products a quick way to find farmers in their area with products to sell.

"The NCFarmFresh.com Web site can sort information by county, by region and by commodity, making it easier for shoppers to find a local food source," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "We want to help consumers find farmers in their areas, especially as more and more shoppers express interest in buying foods that haven't traveled very far from the field to the table."

NCFarmFresh.com has been active for around five years and includes more than 1,000 retail farms, 119 certified roadside stands, 116 farmers markets, community-supported agriculture operations, nurseries, retail garden centers and similar outlets that sell directly to the public. The site has traditionally focused on fruits and vegetables, nursery products and Christmas trees, but now lists farmers who sell meat and dairy products too.

Agriculture and agribusiness represent the state's number one industry, generating more than \$70 billion for the economy.

"North Carolina is the fourth most agriculturally diverse state in the country, meaning consumers have lots of locally grown options," Troxler said. "To me, food tastes better the closer it is to the farm, so I encourage consumers to shop locally for the freshest products around and taste the difference for themselves."

The department launched a statewide advertising campaign in early May encouraging consumers to use the Web site to find local vendors. The campaign is being funded by special grants from the

From the tractor

What would you think if this was your last issue of the *Ag Review*? That could be a reality if an option being offered for the state budget finds enough supporters in the legislature.

I received word just prior to publication of this issue that one option being presented for House budget writers to consider is to do away with all funding for the *Agricultural Review* newspaper, which has been in publication in its current form since 1926.

In total, the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services is looking at roughly a 10-percent cut to its budget, and that pain will be felt across programs and services that we provide. Other proposals presented by legislative fiscal analysts are increases on some of the department's fees.

The reality is, these cuts are going to hurt. We will be at a point where we will have no choice but to do less with less.

While it is still early in the budget process, I felt it was important to let readers know about this possible development because I know how passionate you are about the *Agricultural*



Review, and I understand what a negative impact this would have on agricultural commerce.

Cost for printing and mailing the *Agricultural Review* is roughly \$100,000 a year, less than \$10,000 an issue. One of the paper's greatest values is being an important tool for commerce between farmers. For example, in October 2008, which represents an average month for the newspaper, there was more than \$17.6 million worth of items and services listed for sale.

For some farms, advertising in the *Agricultural Review* provides a source of income or cash flow through services or products sold.

Ultimately, the final decisions will be made by the budget committees in the legislature.

I will keep you posted on any updates we receive.

In these tough economic times, many people are finding themselves in situations they have not been in before. The loss of a job or the cancellation of a production contract can throw a family into turmoil.

That is especially true for farm families, who often have big investments tied up in production and few, if any, safety nets to weather economic storms or sudden market turns.

To help, we have launched a new Web site aimed at pork and poultry producers whose contracts with integrators have been cut or terminated because of economic conditions.

We are calling the site, the Growers Assistance Information Network – or GAIN for short. Farmers will find information and contacts that could assist with financial planning, alternative markets and other topics relevant to their situation. The site can be

accessed at www.ncagr.gov/gain.

We have also included a checklist of immediate steps farmers should take if they lose their contract.

Although the GAIN site is focused primarily on contract poultry and pork producers, the information on the site may be useful to any farmer who is looking for new opportunities for their operations.

Information can be accessed by agency name or by topic. The site includes contact information for resources at the NCDA&CS, USDA, N.C. State University, N.C. A&T State University and other state agencies, plus some non-profits.

The N.C. Department of Environment and Natural Resources Division of Water Quality will hold public hearings on behalf of the Environmental Management Commission regarding proposed adoption of rules that would require animal operations to monitor surface waters for possible nitrogen and bacteria impacts.

Under the proposed rules, routine monitoring of surface waters at animal operations would be required. Samples would determine ammonia, nitrate, fecal coliform, biochemical oxygen demand and chloride levels. The proposed rules would also establish the order in which animal operations will be brought into the monitoring program. Initial emphasis will be in watersheds with known nutrient impairment issues.

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Troxler advises farmers to prepare for hurricane season

As the 2009 hurricane season nears, Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler reminds farmers to take necessary steps to help protect their farms, families and workers if a storm strikes.

“Planning is essential to reducing the potential damage from hurricanes and tropical storms,” Troxler said. “Preparing now can help farmers avoid learning hard lessons later.”

Hurricane season runs June 1-Nov. 30, and weather forecasters predict 12 to 16 named tropical storms in the Atlantic this year.

Farmers need to make preparations for their families, workers, equipment and buildings, and have backup plans for electricity for their barns and other critical farm facilities, Troxler said. In addition, livestock operations should maintain emergency plans that address power needs and on-site feed capabilities.

Troxler said farmers should have a transfer switch properly installed so they can use a generator. A properly

installed transfer switch is critical for the protection of farm facilities and utility workers, he said.

Troxler offered the following tips for preparing farms for major storms:

- Store or secure items or equipment that might blow away.
- Identify places to relocate animals from low-lying areas.
- Check generators to be sure they are in good working order and secure a sufficient amount of fuel to operate them.
- Turn off the propane supply at tanks.
- Secure propane tanks in the event of flooding to prevent them from floating away.
- Move equipment to the highest open ground possible away from trees or buildings that could cause damage.
- Mark animals with an identifier so they can be easily returned if lost. Examples are ear tags with name of farm and phone numbers, brands, paint markings on hooves or

coat or clipped initials in the hair.

- Move feed to higher ground or to a more accessible place in case of flooding or transportation problems.
- Coordinate with neighbors beforehand and discuss what resources can be shared. Examples include a backhoe or set of livestock panels.
- Keep a list of important phone numbers in order to make calls following a storm. Examples include the local emergency management office, county extension agent, insurance agent, county Farm Service Agency and private veterinarian.
- Monitor local weather reports for up-to-the-minute information on storms.

In addition, pesticide applicators should look to secure their pesticide storage areas. Applicators in low-lying areas should do whatever they can to elevate or move pesticides to locations that are less likely to flood.

Strawberry Field Day Tour at Piedmont Research Station

Facts about ethanol fuels in North Carolina

Editor's note: The N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services routinely gets questions about ethanol. We asked Stephen Benjamin, director of the department's Standards Division, to provide a few facts about this alternative fuel and rules pertaining to its use in North Carolina.

The federal government mandated the use of ethanol in the 2005 Energy Policy Act. The volume of ethanol to be used nationwide was increased in the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007. This has forced oil companies to look for new markets, such as North Carolina, for ethanol-blended gasolines because their traditional markets are already saturated.

Currently, there is no state law mandating the use of ethanol in gasoline. However, over the past several months we have seen that 30 percent of gas stations are selling blends of 10 percent ethanol and 90 percent gasoline. We expect this trend to continue as the availability of ethanol increases and the cost remains competitive with gasoline. In addition, the volume of ethanol that must be blended nationwide continues to grow each year, with 11.1 million gallons scheduled for 2009.

Here are a few important facts about ethanol:

- Gasoline with up to 10 percent ethanol is safe to use in most vehicles and small engines. Check the owner's manual to be sure.
- Storage tanks must be kept free of water and should be monitored on a regular basis.
- Ethanol is blended with gasoline at the terminals, not the gas station, so it is unlikely there will be a fuel sold with greater than 10 percent ethanol in it.
- Locations selling gasoline containing up to 10 percent ethanol are not required to label the pumps as “contains ethanol,” but many have done so voluntarily.
- E85 (a mixture of 85 percent ethanol, 15 percent gasoline) is a separate product for use only in Flex Fuel Vehicles. It must be labeled as “E85” and is available at only about a dozen retail locations in North Carolina.
- The N.C. Motor Fuels Laboratory and its field staff routinely test for the percentage of ethanol, among other things, in gasoline samples purchased across the state. When the lab identifies a problem, the station must stop selling the fuel until the problem is corrected.

“Food safety remains an important issue for the produce industry,” Troxler said. “Buyers are demanding assurances from growers that their produce is safe. It's going to become more difficult for farmers to market their fruits and vegetables if they don't have a program in place to make sure their produce is free of contamination”

Agrotips

Set up an escrow account to avoid delay in processing of agronomic samples

The Agronomic Division charges a fee for laboratory analysis of plant tissue, waste, source water, nutrient solutions, soilless media and soil (heavy metals analysis and nematode assay only). When these samples arrive without payment, they cannot be processed. The client must be contacted and invoiced. The samples are set aside until payment is received.

Clients can help prevent these delays by calling the division, setting up an escrow account and keeping an adequate balance on hand. This is the most convenient form of payment for clients and for the division. Clients who choose not to establish an escrow account are urged to pay by check. The use of cash is not advisable since sample shipments may be left unattended on the Agronomic Division's loading dock during nonbusiness hours.

Use bar-code labels to track arrival of agronomic sample shipments

Clients who want to know when their soil (and/or other agronomic) samples arrive at the laboratory should use bar-coded address labels available from the Division's Web site www.ncagr.gov/agronomi. Just follow the links to print the desired number of labels, and tape one to the outside of each package of samples. When packages arrive at the lab, they will be scanned and the client will receive an e-mail notification of their arrival.

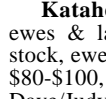

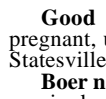

Pesticide record-keeping rules change for growers, aerial applicators

RALEIGH – Several new pesticide record-keeping rules went into effect May 1 following approval by the N.C. Pesticide Board. The new rules involve recording the ending time of applications, the recording of daily applications and how long growers must maintain records

The changes reflect recommendations of the 2008 Governor's Task Force on Preventing Agricultural Pesticide Exposure and implement the requirements of Senate Bill 847.

Growers making applications that fall under the scope of the federal Worker Protection Standard must now add the actual "end time" of application to the records under the change. This is in addition to the "time of the application" that is required to be posted before the application takes place under the current WPS regulations.

Also each day of application must be recorded as a separate application record. After application information has been displayed for the appropriate

time (30 days after the restricted-entry period expires), the application information must now be maintained for a period of two years. This coincides with the USDA Requirements for Restricted-Use Pesticides.

Also effective May 1, aerial applicators must record the year, month, date and time of day when each pesticide application was completed for every pesticide application. Additionally, each day of aerial applications must be recorded as a separate record. The commercial ground applicators regulation addressing the same issues for restricted-use pesticides became effective April 1.
