Seedling sales under way

The North Carolina Forest Service Nursery Program will be accepting orders for seedlings on July 2. The NCFS produces about 16 million quality seedlings for nearly 50 species of conifers and hardwoods annually, including an expanded selection of control mass-pollinated loblolly pine seedlings. They offer superior growth, form and disease resistance due to solid nursery research and production experience.

"Trees are one of North Carolina's greatest renewable resources and an important economic driver in North Carolina, contributing around \$32.7 billion annually to the state's economy and provide more than 150,000 jobs for North Carolinians through the forest products industry," said N.C. Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler.

The NCFS nursery program has a large, reader-friendly catalog from which to order tree seedlings. Landowners can find information about the types of tree species, quantities and costs on the inside pages of

Construction begins on NCDA&CS Agricultural Sciences Center \$107 million building projected to be completed in 2020

The corner of Reedy Creek and Edwards Mill roads in Raleigh will look a lot different in the coming years. Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler and special guests broke ground July 23 on the 220,000-square-foot N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services Agricultural Sciences Center.

The \$107 million project is projected to be completed in 2020. The building will replace five NCDA&CS facilities, most with labs more than 40 years old.

"This is an exciting time for us as we break ground on a state-of-the-art building that is 40 years in the making," said Troxler. "This is the largest building project ever

undertaken by the department. I am proud of the effort that has gone into making this building a reality, and I look forward to continuing to serve the needs of the agricultural and agribusiness industry and the citizens of North Carolina. I consider this lab to be a long-term investment in the future of agriculture, North Carolina's No. 1 industry."

The center will replace facilities used by the department's Food and Drug Protection, Standards, Structural Pest Control and Pesticides, and Veterinary divisions. The labs work focuses on food safety, animal disease diagnosis, weights and measures calibration, and motor fuel qual-

NCDA&CS offers organic cost-share grants

Organic growers in North Carolina can apply for partial reimbursement of the cost of becoming certified or for recertification through a program offered by the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Growers who are certified or recertified between Oct. 1, 2017, and Sept. 30, 2018, can apply for assistance through the program.

"Applicants can be reimbursed up to 75 percent of the cost of organic certification per

category," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "Funds are available on a first-come, first-served basis, and I would encourage growers and handlers to submit their applications early."

Under the grant, operations can be certified and reimbursed in four separate categories: crops, livestock, wild crop and handler/processor. The maximum reimbursement per category is \$750.

The program is for the 2017-2018 season and is fund-

ed through a \$181,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Applications must be postmarked by Nov. 30.

To apply, growers must provide a completed application, along with detailed invoices/statements from the certifying agency listing all National Organic Program certified costs, proof of payment, a substitute W-9 form and a copy of your certificate or letter from your certifier if this is a new certification. All charges

must be for USDA organic certification. The application can be downloaded at www.ncda-organic.org. or growers can also apply through their local Farm Service Agency office.

From the tractor

It has been a very busy time at the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, maybe even busier than normal, and that is saying a lot.

There was a flurry of activity near the end of the legislative session as the legislature debated the N.C. Farm Act, which included limitations on judgements in nuisance lawsuits and discussions about what constitutes milk under Food and Drug Administration rules.

Over the past month I have attended two rallies in support of North Carolina farmers, particularly hog farmers in the wake of nuisance lawsuits in the courts now.

As of press time, juries have ruled against hog farms in two of the cases. Another case is being heard.

In both cases, jurors were not allowed to visit farms that were the subject of the nuisance suits, which I believe was unfair to the farmers. We'll continue to watch these cases, but I am concerned what is happening to these farmers could happen to any farmer in the state.

It costs a lot to defend oneself in a court of law, even if you have not done anything wrong.

Farms are the source of all of our food, but unfortunately too many people think food comes from the grocery store. While you

can most certainly buy it there, not a single product is grown in the grocery store.

As I told people at the rallies, I believe farmers are not a nuisance, they are a blessing. Most of us enjoy the fruits of their labor three times a day. We need to be thanking them for what they do to help ensure a safe, abundant and affordable food supply. They are most productive in their fields and on their farms, not in a courtroom.

On the milk language in the Farm Act, we raised the issue of the liberal use of the term "milk," on a variety of beverages, asking the legislature to support our enforcement of an existing FDA regulation against products that use the label of milk, but are a plant-based beverage.

Our goal is not to remove these plant-based products from the marketplace, but to ensure

they are accurately and properly labeled. Current law states that milk must be derived from a mammal, not plant-based. Specifically, it should be from a hooved animal.

We see the same value of standards of identity for other foods such as orange juice, spring water, ice cream and seafood.

The term milk has no less value than other standardized foods. The consumer should expect truth in labeling.

I am pleased that FDA Commissioner Scott Gottlieb recently indicated publicly that FDA would be moving to take action on the use of the term milk for non-dairy products. FDA plans to take comments at an open meeting July 26 in Washington D.C. We intend to add our voice to this issue.

ity. The center will provide space for about 200 employees.

Following are NCDA&CS divisions moving into the Agricultural Sciences Center:

The Food and Drug Protection Division serves as the main food safety and defense testing lab in the state, processing about 20,000 samples each year.

The Veterinary Division's lab is the central veterinary lab in the state. Last year, it performed more than 570,000 animal disease diagnostic tests and over 3,500 necropsies.

The Standards Division's weights and measures lab calibrated more than 23,000 weights used in industry or by scale service companies. It also serves almost 500 customers from the pharmaceutical, defense, manufacturing and other industries.

The Standards Division's motor fuels lab monitors fuel quality. This lab tests about 21,000 sam-

ples of gasoline, diesel, kerosene and motor oil a year and makes more than 75,000 determinations from those tests.

The Structural Pest Control and Pesticides Division administered more than 1,500 structural exams and more than 6,000 pesticide exams last year.

HH Architecture of Raleigh designed the NCDA&CS Agricultural Sciences Center. A partnership of T.A. Loving Construction Company of Goldsboro and J.E. Dunn of Kansas City will serve as construction managers for the project.

Horse owners urged to vaccinate against mosquito-borne diseases

Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler is encouraging horse owners to have their animals vaccinated against Eastern Equine Encephalomyelitis and West Nile Virus.

"Prime mosquito-breeding season runs through November in North Carolina and horses are at risk if not properly vaccinated," Troxler said. "Triple E is fatal 90 percent of the time in horses and West Nile Virus has a fatality rate of 30 percent. Both diseases are preventable by vaccination."

There were six recorded N.C. cases of EEE in horses in 2017, but the mild winter could increase that number this year, State Veterinarian Doug Meckes said.

Symptoms of EEE include impaired vision, aimless wandering, head pressing, circling, inability to swallow, irregular staggering gait, paralysis, convulsions and death. Once a horse has been bitten by an infected mosquito, it may take three to 10 days for symptoms to appear.

Symptoms of West Nile Virus include fever, weakness or pa-

ralysis of hind limbs, impaired vision, head pressing, seizures and aimless wandering.

"If your horses or other equine animals exhibit any symptoms of EEE or WNV, contact your veterinarian immediately," Meckes said.

Meckes recommends that equine owners talk to their veterinarians about an effective vaccination protocol to protect horses from mosquito-borne diseases. The combo vaccination initially requires two shots, 30 days apart, for horses, mules and donkeys

that have no prior vaccination history. Meckes recommends a booster shot every six months.

"It's also a great time to make sure your animal is current on its rabies vaccination, Meckes said. "In North Carolina we see about five cases of rabies in livestock each year. Horses are naturally curious animals, which puts them at risk for a bite if a rabid animal gets through their fence line."

Mosquitoes can breed in any puddle that lasts for more than four days, so removing any source of standing water can reduce the

chance of exposing animals to WNV or EEE. Keeping horses in stalls at night, using insect screens and fans and turning off lights after dusk can also help reduce exposure to mosquitoes. Insect repellants can be effective if used according to the instructions.

People, horses and birds can become infected from a bite by a mosquito carrying the diseases, but there is no evidence that horses can transmit the viruses to other horses, birds or people through direct contact.

ADFPTF awards more than \$4.6 million in grants

The N.C. Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund recently awarded more than \$4.6 million to help communities across the state protect farmland and promote agricultural enterprises. Conservation easements were obtained on 2,590 acres of land across the state through the grants.

"This is an important day for farm families in North Carolina," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "These easements ensure that these working farms remain in production for many years to come and help to keep agriculture as our state's top industry."

The following is a list of awarded projects:

-- Alamance County received \$181,935 to preserve 88 acres of a dairy farm and \$164,805 for a conservation easement on 75 acres of cropland.

-- Beaufort Soil and Water Conservation District received \$147,855 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on 159 acres of cropland.

-- Buncombe Soil and Water Conservation District received \$198,650 to help purchase a perpetual conservation ease-

ment on an 85-acre farm and \$268,950 to preserve 135 acres of farm and forestland.

-- Cabarrus Soil and Water Conservation District received \$116,516 to preserve 59 acres of cropland.

-- Conserving Carolina received \$327,250 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on 75 acres of a farm in Henderson County.

-- Duplin Soil and Water Conservation District received \$47,474 to help purchase a 20-year term conservation easement on 246 acres of cropland.

-- Eno River Association received \$39,655 to help purchase a perpetual conservation easement on a 37-acre farm in Orange County and \$84,460 to preserve 56 acres of farm and forestland in Orange County.

-- Foothills Conservancy of North Carolina received \$273,125 to purchase a perpetual conservation easement on a 194-acre farm in Burke County.

-- Haywood Soil and Water Conservation District received \$269,979 for a conservation easement on a 34-acre farm and \$202,220 to preserve 49 acres of a beef cattle farm.

-- The LandTrust for Cen-

tral North Carolina received \$135,425 to preserve a 135-acre farm in Randolph County.

-- The Southwestern N.C. Resource Conservation and Development Council received \$128,484 for a perpetual conservation easement on 20-acre farm in Haywood County.

-- Swain Soil and Water Conservation District received \$65,800 for a project to expand facilities for Swain County High School's FFA animal husbandry program.

-- Triangle Land Conservancy received \$62,045 to preserve a 34-acre farm in Chatham County.

Take waterfall safety seriously

In 2016, Transylvania County experienced six waterfall fatalities, prompting the creation of a waterfall safety campaign by the Transylvania County Tourism Development Authority. The campaign kicked off last year in conjunction with local leadership at Pisgah National Forest, DuPont State Recreational Forest, Gorges State Park and Transylvania County EMS, among others.

To help stress waterfall safety this year, the TCTDA sponsored a waterfall safety press event on June 13 in Pisgah National Forest at the Cove Creek Group Campground with representatives from the campaign and Mission Hospital.

"While Transylvania County has the largest concentration of waterfalls in North Carolina, there are several other neighboring counties that are experiencing the same problems," said David Casey, district ranger for the Pisgah Ranger District which encompasses Transylvania, Buncombe and Haywood counties. "Ideally, we'd like this initiative to become a regional effort."

Jackie Gosnell, trauma program manager with Mission Health, said they conducted a data review on waterfall accident patients that arrived at Mission Hospital from 2016 to 2017. The data showed a 47 percent reduction in waterfall injuries from 2016 to 2017, with only one fatality last year in Transylvania County.

However, recent waterfall fatalities in upstate South Carolina at Whitewater Falls, another at Elk River Falls in Avery County and one at Pisgah National Forest's Rainbow Falls, underscore the fact that waterfall safety remains an important topic. This, coupled with record park and forest visitation in recent years, has also further reinforced the need to spread the word and point out the potential of injury and even death.

"We don't want to scare people, but we do want to do our best to help prepare visitors so they can enjoy a forest experience safely and responsibly," said Bruce MacDonald, a ranger at DuPont State Recreational Forest. "Unlike an amusement park, our forests are not engineered for safety. That's the mindset that we're trying hard to impart to visitors."

There has been an upward trend over the last several years when it comes to waterfall incidents in Transylvania, Haywood and Henderson counties, according to Scott Justus, Deputy Fire Marshal for Transylvania County Emergency Services.

"For every one fatality that you hear about, you have 10 or more injuries such as, broken bones, head injuries and sprained ankles that we respond to, that do not make the news," Justus said. "We want everyone to enjoy the waterfalls, but to be safe doing it."

The Mission Health Data, showed that 18 percent of the patients that came to the hospi-

tal with waterfall related injuries were severely injured, 12 percent of patients were discharged to a skilled nursing facility or to rehabilitation and 13 percent died. The data also showed that 74 percent of the waterfall related injuries that came into the facility were considered minor, and 26 percent were discharged from the emergency department, while 49 percent were admitted with an average hospital stay of just over four days.

The people most likely to sustain a waterfall-related injury are an average age of 27, with 66 percent falling between the ages of 11 and 25 years old. The review also found that 26 percent of waterfall-related accidents were out-of-state tourists. Of those from in-state, 76 percent lived in Western North Carolina, while 24 percent were from other areas.

It's important to note that the review does not capture deaths declared on scene, or other patients whose injuries were tended to at another hospital and who were not transferred to Mission.

"It's clear that our waterfall safety initiative needs to be directed toward visitors and residents alike," said Grant Bullard, chairman of the Transylvania County Tourism Development Authority. "The last thing we want is for someone's day in the woods ruined because of a momentary lack of judgement or carelessness. If we can begin raising people's level of awareness while they are in and around wa-

Hardwoods are sold in quantities as low as 10 and conifers in quantities as low as 50. For

those wishing to purchase larger orders, the nursery will continue to sell tree seedlings by the hundreds and thousands. Demand for these seedlings is up, so anyone interested in buying trees are encouraged to order early.

terfalls, we can prevent a lot of these accidents."

To emphasize the resources needed and the difficulty involved in waterfall rescues, a team from the Transylvania County Emergency Management and Transylvania County Rescue Squad, performed a staged waterfall rescue for the media. Justus conducted the waterfall safety rescue exercise for the event.

"You would be amazed at the resources that need to be put into motion when you have a serious incident," Justus said. "The United States Forest Service here in Pisgah, the North Carolina Forest Service in DuPont, North Carolina State Parks in Gorges, Transylvania County Emergency Services, Transylvania County Rescue Squad and the eight volunteer and paid fire departments across the county. The list goes on and on."

Mark Shepherd, a physician's assistant on Mission Hospital's trauma team, says that many of the people they see have massive head trauma. This

coupled with the difficulty of getting the injured person from the back country to the hospital can take a long time.

"We talk about the 'golden hour' in trauma, that's how long between the time of injury to the time they need to get to us," Shepherd said. "Sometimes that's impossible for local responders because of how far out some of these waterfalls are. So, it's really important people make good decisions."

8 Tips for safely viewing a waterfall:

The best view is at the base of waterfalls.

Don't climb on rocks above waist height.

Read all posted signs leading into a waterfall area.

Stay on marked trails.

Never cross a waterway at the top of waterfalls.

Avoid rocks and ledges that may be slippery with algae and moss.

Waterfall pools are extremely turbulent and likely to pull a swimmer under the water.

NEVER, EVER jump off a waterfall.
